Brief History

Development of Finchwood Park

Finchwood Park features a remarkable expanse of over 140 acres of green open space, drawing on the heritage and unique character of the local landscape, a woodland setting that has evolved over centuries. Finchwood Park has been designed to create walkable neighbourhoods well-connected to village amenities as well as cycle links.

Trees and hedgerows, woodland clearings and water courses each offering an abundance of ecological and wildlife habitats. New infrastructure will include new parkland and public gardens, play areas and outdoor sports areas. 50% of Finchwood Park will be public open space.

History of Finchampstead

The parish church of St James with its 12th century origins, old Roman roads and distinctive wide 'Ridges' forged through the area, Finchampstead's history can be seen in every inch of the landscape.

Finchampstead village itself sits at the top of Fleet Hill in a richly wooded area once part of Windsor Forest and hunting places of royalty. A local tale tells of Henry VII bringing his son to the Finchampstead Ridges to meet his bride-to-be, Catherine of Aragon.

Finchampstead is said to have derived its name from the large variety of finches that still populate the area.

Finchwood Park is an informal recreational area built on the grounds of the Grade II listed West Court manor house in Finchampstead. The 28.1-hectare site is made up of a mosaic of habitats, including woodland, rough grassland, glades, hedgerows, ponds, and wetlands.

The site consists of a network of surfaced and non-surfaced footpaths, and crosses the Devil's Highway historic roman road.

The majority of footpaths on the site are rough hard-surfaced, with some stabilised non-surfaced paths. The non-surfaced paths may become muddy in wetter months. There are no steep inclines on the site. Therefore, most of the site is accessible to wheelchair users who have sturdy chairs.

Welcome to Finchwood Park

North Wetlands

This field is home to a small wetland, and is surrounded by mature hedgerows and woodland, creating a unique landscape and habitat for wildlife. It also features a meadow area, and provides a rich mosaic of habitats, which is good for biodiversity.

This area was previously used as farmland before the wetland was created. The wetland features are still part of a sustainable drainage system for the housing around it, which helps to manage flooding, and at the same time.



Ancient Woodland

The trees that lie straight ahead along the far edge of the field, are classified as Ancient Woodland. These trees are part of a woodland which has been present since at least 1600AD, and forms an invaluable and unique habitat for wildlife, providing the ideal conditions for some locally important species to thrive.

Ancient Woodland is often regarded as some of the richest and most complex terrestrial habitat in the UK, as the soils often remain undisturbed for centuries. As a result, archaeological features associated with past industry and management, can often be found within it.

Woodland Fact: Only 2.4% of the UK is classified as ancient woodland.

Circular Walks

A 0.26 mile circular walk skirts the edge of ponds and provides a good view of the woodland as you walk along it. You can take a shortcut through the woodland and explore other circular walks along the way.

Look out for more interpretation panels along the other routes.

Wetlands

The main part of the wetland comprises of wet meadow grass and willow species, that can cope with wet and dry conditions. Around the pond you may notice marginal plants, such as Water Forget-me-not and Spearwort, which thrive closer to the waters edge.

Wildlife to look out for

- Look out for Damselfly and Dragonflies close to the water, between May and August.
- Look out for Green Woodpeckers near woodland trees, and Lapwings around the meadows and the ponds.

Cycling is a low impact type of exercise which can help you lose weight, reduce stress and improve your fitness

The cycle network in Wokingham Borough is continually being improved and there is a greenway (for cyclists/walkers) between Commonfield Lane, Arborfield and Finchampstead Baptist Centre.

Buses to Wokingham

The Leopard 3 serves the Marino Way bus stop on Nine Mile Ride Extension and travels to Wokingham. The bus stops at Wokingham Train Station before it goes into the Town Centre. It takes approximately 5 minutes to walk to the bus stop.

Buses to Reading

The Leopard 3 bus serves the Marino Way bus stop on Nine Mile Ride Extension and travels to Reading train station via Royal Berkshire Hospital. It takes approximately 5 minutes to walk to the bus stop.

Winnersh Triangle Park & Ride

Winnersh Triangle Park & Ride is located at Wharfedale Road, Winnersh, RG41 5RD. There are four buses an hour to Reading.

Mereoak Park & Ride

Mereoak Park & Ride 600

Running Monday to Saturday to Central Reading up to every 15 minutes during the day. On Sundays Mereoak Park & Ride 600 route provides an hourly service between Mereoak Park & Ride and central Reading.

Hospital Park & Ride 300

Running Monday to Friday between 6am and 7pm, the hospital Park & Ride 300 service links the Royal Berkshire Hospital with the Mereoak and Thames Valley park & ride sites.

Long Distance Coaches

Rail travel is a faster, more relaxing and less stressful way to travel on business, and it's easy and hassle-free for leisure trips with your family and friends

Wokingham is the nearest station to Finchwood Park. Your nearest bus stop is 5 minutes walk from Finchwood Park. The Leopard 3 services travels between Finchwood Park and Wokingham train station. It takes approximately 25 minutes to cycle to Wokingham Station from Finchwood Park.

Four trains an hour depart for Reading Station, two direct trains an hour to London Waterloo and two direct trains an hour to Guildford, Redhill and Gatwick Airport. Some additional services are provided at peak times.

The station is located on Station Approach, RG40 2AP. It has a cafe, 118 sheltered cycle storage spaces and 531 parking spaces.

There is also a bike repair stand at the station for cyclists to carry out minor adjustments to their bikes or pump their tyres up.

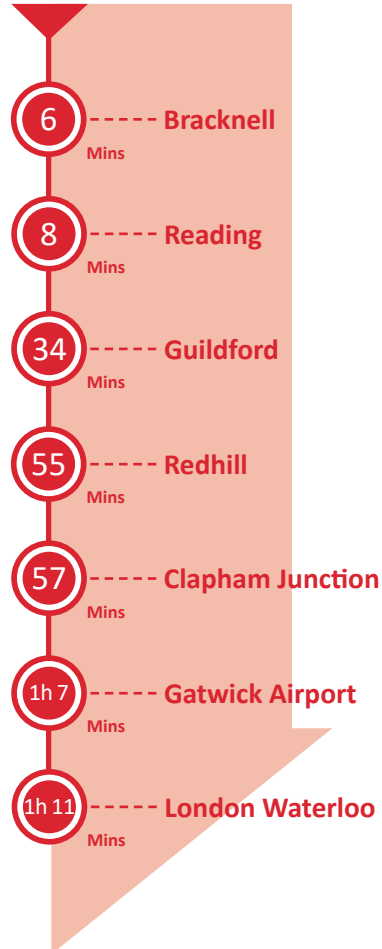
